pastor

So we reached out to those marginalized because of unemployment, and through the generosity of all of you, we hit the streets to feed the hungry. Speaking of food, I have been blessed by so many of you who have dropped off food for me these past 8 months.

Who knows what is in store for the next several months. Thanksgiving and Christmas gatherings will look different this year. Hopefully our country will start to heal. We pray that we find a vaccine and begin to contain this virus soon. What we do know is that God will be with us. As Mary and Joseph discovered, and so have we, with God, all is possible. With Mary and Joseph, we too are called to bring Christ into the world.

I miss all of you. I miss our gatherings and all the vibrant activities of St. Mary Student Parish. I long to be with you again. I am also grateful for you. Your faith inspires my own. We walk together with Christ and with one another. I am grateful for your ongoing support of our parish. Your generosity pays the bills and allows me to sleep at night. Your generosity also helps families who are restless at night with the worry of paying their bills. Thank you!

Let's continue to pray for one another and love one another. God will continue to lead us if we continue to open our hearts and our hands. Let Mary's prayer continue to be our own, "here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word."



MASS in a pandemic

Campus was already abuzz with news of the coronavirus as students, faculty, and staff prepared for spring break. The consensus was that it was business as usual. Our annual Alternative Spring Break experiences, including travel to Los Angeles and to the Dominican Republic, would continue. Other students traveled back to their hometowns, eagerly seeking rest from a rigorous semester.


But returning to campus, there was no way to anticipate the tidal wave that was swiftly approaching. On Friday, March 20, the parish leadership team made the difficult decision to close the parish to the public effective immediately. No student gatherings, no office hours, and the most difficult decision of all, no mass. St. Mary Student Parish was the first Catholic parish to close in Ann Arbor, a decision later echoed by almost every place of worship in Ann Arbor during the immediate onset of COVID-19.

Within just two days of this decision we were up and running with live-streamed Sunday mass on our website. The dispensation from physically attending Sunday mass within the Diocese of Lansing was in effect through the end of the summer, and would be extended through the end of Ordinary Time in November. But what happened next would shape the future of worship at St. Mary Student Parish.

As we began streaming, hundreds of households tuned in to watch mass virtually, celebrating the Eucharist – without the Eucharist. Despite microphone mishaps and internet connectivity issues, week after week households around Ann Arbor and across the United States were tuning into our parish. Parishioners who were homebound or residing in assisted living could watch mass at their home parish. Families across the country could click play at just the same time and watch the very same mass. Alumni were tuning in from the coast to coast.

Launching our streaming masses in English, we quickly added a Spanish mass, and we are now streaming monthly masses for graduate students and young professionals, as well as masses on Thursdays as part of our weekly undergraduate Ig.nite event.

While we're consistently working to improve the quality and consistency of our streaming masses, one thing is certain: the live-streamed masses are here to stay. We invite you to join us for mass on Sundays at 9:00 am in English or 10:00 am in Spanish on our website stmarystudentparish.org.





FAITH DOING JUSTICE

While students, faculty, and staff were eagerly awaiting the University of Michigan's decision to move forward with in-person classes for the fall semester, it was clear that even if students returned to Ann Arbor, the semester would be far from normal. When the decision came in early August to physically invite students back, there was little time to plan.

In a pandemic, gatherings, if any, must remain small. A truly unprecedented hurdle for campus ministry! A typical Sunday at St. Mary involved hundreds of students joining us for mass, with 70-80 sticking around for Sunday snacks and study breaks in our lounge. Meanwhile, on Thursdays, over 200 students came together for mass followed by dinner and faith-based conversation during Ig.nite.

While the number of COVID-19 cases rose and fell, retreats and faith-sharing groups were forced to go virtual. But one major challenge remained: how can our students grow in their faith that does justice without encountering their brothers and sisters in the community?

By reflecting on their experiences and learning about their faith, student leaders and interns were invited to participate in the Faith Doing Justice social media campaign, spearheaded by senior Cecilia Rivet. Consider this a different kind of virtual program, with the added bonus that the audience has expended to include resident parishioners, families, and alumni.

Cecilia identified three important issues to focus on during the

fall semester: racial justice, the election, and hunger and homelessness.

In September, her campaign began with the **Novena for Racial Justice**. Everyday for 9 days, different undergraduate students (with an occasional alumnus) shared a video inviting all to unite in prayer for a world where the human dignity of all is upheld. The novena concluded with an in-person outdoor vigil on September 18th in our courtyard.

For October, the focus was the upcoming election. Launching a video series entitled "Voting as an Act of Love," students highlighted the seven tenets of Catholic Social Teaching: Life and Dignity of the Human Person, Call to Family, Community and Participation, Rights and Responsibilities, Option for the Poor and Vulnerable, The Dignity of Work and the Rights of Workers, Care for God's Creation, and Solidarity. Cecilia shares:

"This teaching reminds me of our Catholic intention to build a just society and our belief that every person has inherent dignity and a right to life because of that dignity. This reflection empowers and inspires us to vote."

And for November, Cecilia will publish another social media campaign with short videos on hunger and homelessness. We invite you to join us online for this series and to review the Novena for Racial Justice and Voting as an Act of Love series on our facebook page: facebook.com/SMSP.UM.

St. Mary volunteered November 8-16 at Ann Arbor Christian Reformed Church covering meals, hospitality, and overnight shifts.





WE ARE THE BODY OF CHRIST




ANNUAL report

2019-2020 FISCAL YEAR IN REVIEW

St. Mary Student Parish operates on a fiscal year of July 1 through June 30. We ended the 2019-2020 year with a net loss of \$22,720. Our revenue fell short of our budget by \$44,832 and our expenses were \$22,112 less than budget. The majority of the difference in revenue can be attributed to the annual fund. The savings in expenses is due to us essentially closing our buildings on March 20, 2020 in response to COVID-19. While we did open gradually through the remainder of fiscal year, the majority of our regular programming was suspended. We applied for and were granted a loan from the Paycheck Protection Program which helped off-set our loss.

The loss in 2019-2020 was less than the \$172,099 loss incurred in the prior fiscal year. Looking forward to the 2020-2021 fiscal year, we made some staffing changes – both in numbers of staff and in job descriptions – not only in response to how we "do" church during COVID-19 but also to be as fiscally responsible as possible with the generous donations we receive.

STEWARDING YOUR GIFTS

Here at St. Mary, we manage two major sources of income: *Sunday Collections* and the *Annual Fund*, which fund the vast majority of parish operations. In addition, we receive individual gifts that are for more specific programs or ministries. Some of the programs that are frequent recipients of these donations include Faith Doing Justice, Hispanic/Latino Ministry, and Alternative Spring Break.

Sunday Collections

Sunday Collections include all offerings received at our Sunday masses, which is a blend of offering envelopes, checks, and loose cash. They also include online donations specifically noted for Sunday Collections, which is electronically transferred weekly, monthly, and sometimes annually. Donations to Sunday Collections can also be made through the Venmo app @SMSPumich.

Support for Sunday Collections is provided by parishioners, students, and any visitors attending mass.

Annual Fund

Campus Ministry donations received outside of Sunday Collections are placed into the Annual Fund. This includes March Match Madness, year-end donations, appeals to alumni and parents outside of Ann Arbor, and more.
