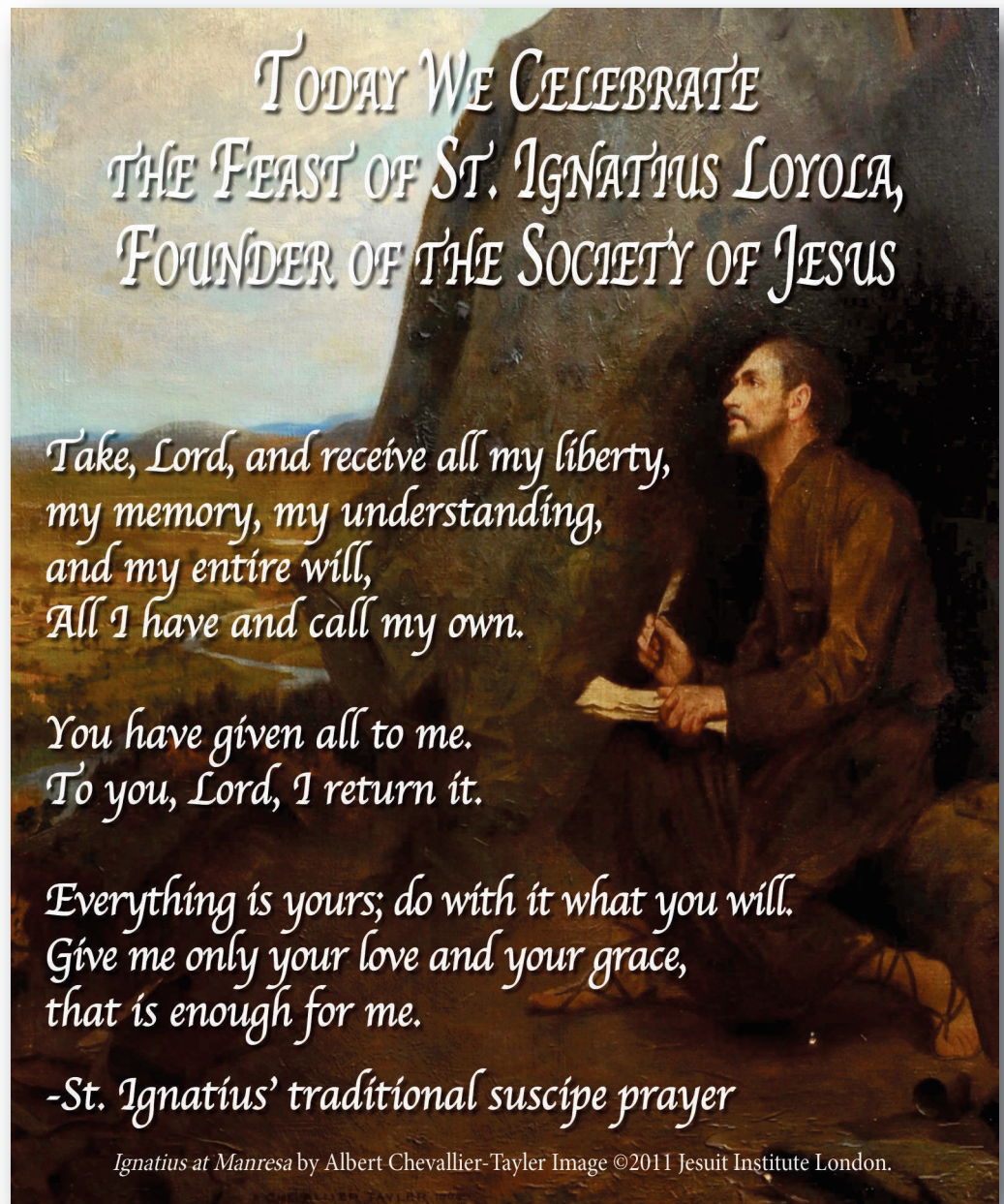

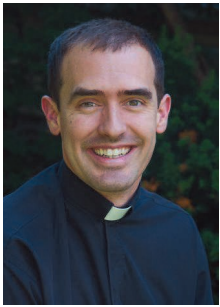

Pastoral Perspective

The first step in the Examen, a prayer popularized by St. Ignatius of Loyola, is gratitude. As I reflect on my past two years here at SMSP, I am deeply grateful for the opportunity this community has given me to grow as a young priest. Jesuit formation never stops. The parish staff has been exceptionally kind, caring and patient as I learned the ropes. They've taught me how to work in a pastoral team. There is no substitute for experience and I'll always be grateful for the team here at SMSP that worked with me (perhaps better said, put up with me) throughout the past two years.

In theology studies we often heard that the people of God are the best teachers of any new priest. It's absolutely true. Thank you for allowing me into your homes and sharing your lives with me. It has been an honor and a privilege to walk with so many of you in times of celebration and joy, as well as in moments of loss and sorrow. Between RCIA, Campus Ministry and Hispanic Ministry I've been able to see so many aspects of SMSP. The students give this parish so much energy and hope. The Jesuit Presence at Our Parish

The Catholic Diocese of Lansing recently approved an agreement that will continue and extend the pastoral care provided by the Society of Jesus at St. Mary Student Parish. This agreement between the Diocese of Lansing and the Jesuits began in 2005, when Fr. Tom McClain, S.J. first joined the parish as pastor. The current agreement extends the arrangement to allow the presence of a Jesuit pastor and priests through June 30, 2021.

The agreement was signed and approved by Bishop Earl Boyea of the Diocese of Lansing and Fr. Brian Paulson, S.J., Provincial of the Chicago-Detroit Province of the Society of Jesus.

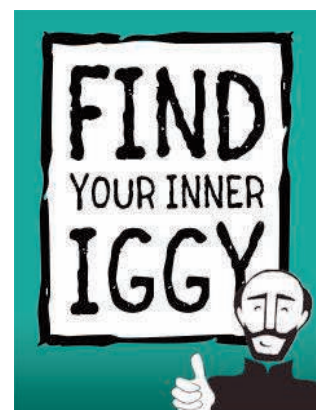
OUR MISSION

The document defines the mission of St. Mary Student Parish:

“Both the Bishop and the Provincial understand that the principal mission of this parish is the pastoral care and formation of students, faculty and staff of the University of Michigan, along with their spouses, children, and other persons who choose to be members. Special priority is placed on the care and formation of undergraduate students, graduate students and young professionals.

All pastoral efforts and decisions will flow from the heart of the Church and its commitment to evangelization of the young.”

In addition, the parish will continue to support its Hispanic/Latino community and ministry. It will also work to develop the faith formation of young adult students and promote Ignatian spirituality and the teachings of St. Ignatius of Loyola, the founder of the Society of Jesus.



WHO ARE THE JESUITS?

Jesuit priests and brothers belong to the Society of Jesus, a religious order of the Roman Catholic Church, founded in 1540 by St. Ignatius of Loyola and his companions. (They are identifiable by the "S.J." following their names.) St. Ignatius' spirituality, captured in the *Spiritual Exercises* and the practice of discerning God's movement in our lives, played a significant role in the spiritual renewal of the church as part of the Counter-Reformation. The founding of Jesuit secondary schools in 1548 and later of Jesuit universities (such as Fordham and Georgetown), along with the *Exercises*, have remained the hallmark of Jesuits' service to the church to the present day. The most notable Jesuit today is Pope Francis, the first Jesuit to become pope since the Society's founding.

Jesuit service – and the service of any person praying with the *Exercises* – responds to each person's response to St Ignatius' three questions before Jesus on the Cross:

- ✠ *What have I done for Christ?*
- ✠ *What am I doing for Christ?*
- ✠ *What will I do for Christ?*

These questions are the inevitable recognition of the person praying that Christ has given so much to me, to us: life itself, spiritual gifts, talents and abilities and the opportunity to use them, family and friends. The response is to desire to follow Christ and to build his kingdom by serving his people, especially those most in need.

Following Christ in this way will lead us into complete joy (John 10) and fuller and more abundant life (John 15.)

THE DAILY EXAMEN IN 6 SIMPLE STEPS

St. Ignatius of Loyola is a great saint for our busy and over-scheduled lives



His first followers ran into the problem of not being able to pray often throughout the day. So, St. Ignatius recommended a practice called **the Examen** – an introspective prayer done at the end of the day:

1. FIND A QUIET PLACE

Go to a place where your phone, the Internet, television, family, or work won't bother you. You might even think about a quiet spot – maybe a peaceful lakefront, a secluded room – to help you center yourself for prayer. Your posture should be comfortable, but attentive. You're about to try to pay more careful attention to the events of your daily life, so don't curl up and go to...Zzzzz.



2. IDENTIFY A MOMENT OF GRATITUDE

Can you name one moment that you are grateful for today? Remember how you felt in that moment. Notice those feelings and simply be grateful for them, knowing that all gifts come from God.



3. ASK FOR FREEDOM

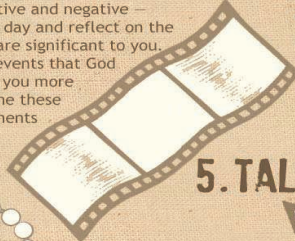
Freedom is one of the main components of Catholic spirituality. When we say freedom we don't mean doing whatever we want. We long for freedom from the things that often trip us up, distract us, or bias our judgments. We pray that the Holy Spirit gives us vision to be free of those things, so we can see the events of our life as they are – not how we'd like things to be or even how we experienced them to be complete with our own prejudices. For example:

"I MIGHT HAVE A FIGHT WITH MY BEST FRIEND AND BELIEVE THAT HE PURPOSEFULLY HURT ME. WHEN I LOOK AT THIS MORE DEEPLY, I FIND THAT I, TOO, SAID HURTFUL WORDS THAT LED HIM TO REACT BADLY. THIS DOESN'T EXCUSE HIS BEHAVIOR BUT IT NOTES MY ROLE IN THE RELATIONSHIP."



4. REVIEW YOUR DAY

Try to recall the events of the past day as if you were watching a movie. What happened when you woke up, ate lunch, or traveled home from school or work? Who did you encounter? Notice your feelings – positive and negative – throughout the day and reflect on the moments that are significant to you. These are the events that God is trying to tell you more about – examine these significant moments more deeply.



5. TALK WITH GOD

Tell God anything that is on your mind. You might express gratitude for something that you were consoled by. You might ask for forgiveness for a moment where you didn't meet expectations. You might look for God's assistance for a particular trouble. Whatever the case, this is your time to be with God, who already knows your needs. Our prayer exists to change us, not to change God. This is our moment to be proactive in seeing who God most wants us to be.



6. FINISH YOUR PRAYER

End your time of prayer with an Our Father (or a similar prayer that you like).

PATTERNS:


When the Examen is done over time, we begin to see the patterns of consolation (times when you feel most alive, energized and connected to God) and desolation (when you feel God's absence or perhaps hopelessness). For example: You might find whenever you are with a particular person you are amazingly energized or perhaps she/he is. That may lead you to develop a deeper relationship with that person. Or you might notice that when you are doing a particular task at work you become filled with energy and vision and find your work to be stellar. You can focus your energy more on these initiatives. You also might find patterns of desolation. Such as, whenever you are in a particular group you end up getting sucked into their drama and become a horrible gossip. Pay attention to your emotions in these patterns.

As we notice these patterns in our lives we begin to see that God desires us to be consoled. These moments are when we most intimately meet God who lurks in our lives hoping that we simply notice his presence in the rhythms of our day.

TIPS:

- Start by doing the Examen for 10-15 minutes at the close of each day. Once you're comfortable with that, add a lunchtime Examen.
- Journal about your experience with the Examen. Jot down your moments of consolation and desolation and note how you feel.
- Don't stress over the details: "Am I doing this right?" "Did I forget a significant moment in my day?" God's not judging you on form. Just pray.

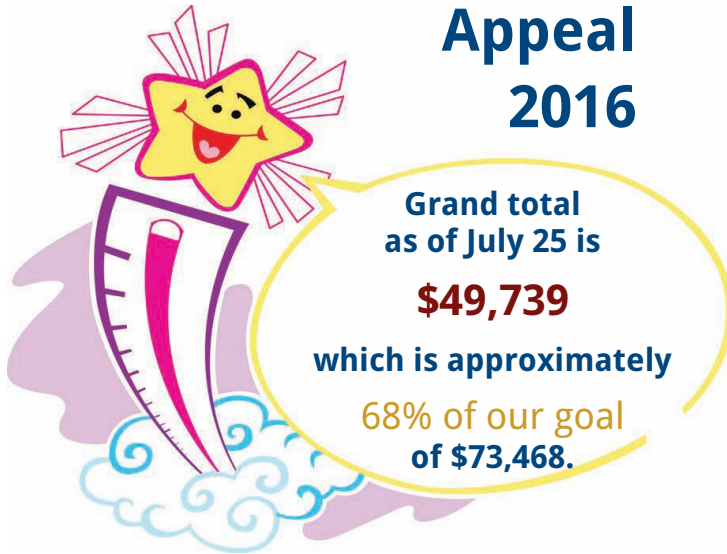

Centering Prayer
Mondays at 6:30 pm

Centering Prayer is a silent practice of prayer that rests on the faith that Christ is present within by his Holy Spirit. It is an excellent preparation for contemplative prayer, which is a grace or gift bestowed by God. Centering Prayer is an intentional openness to, or practice of "waiting" on God, encouraging the building of a more intimate relationship with Jesus and the movement of the Holy Spirit. It is rooted in centuries-old monastic prayer. The book, *Open Mind, Open Heart* by Father Thomas Keating, OCSO, is a good introduction.

The first Monday of each month we listen to an introduction to centering prayer and then pray for 20 minutes. Otherwise, we typically sit and pray for two 20-minute sessions with a short meditative walk in between. All are welcome.

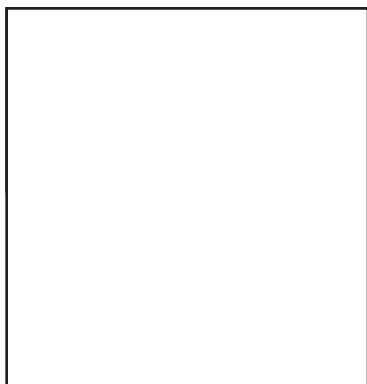
