# WHERE ARE YOU COMING FROM?

If there's one thing that RCIA seekers have in common, it's that there's not much they have in common. That's a good thing. It shows us the immense love of God, who comes and meets us right where we are, taking each

of us by the hand along our own unique path.

I've had the honor of hearing many stories these last few years – stories of why and how people first realize they want to be Catholic, or why they want to deepen their faith. Some have felt an impulse to do something for years, but it didn't feel like the right time. Others felt a profound experience of God at Mass, or somewhere else, and just felt compelled to dig in immediately.

The thing that *is* the same for each of these seekers – and for all of us – is that God is the one who gets things started. For each of us, it's the Holy Spirit who works and interacts in our daily lives – the Holy Spirit who calls and nudges us toward a deeper life in God. How do we respond?

Bishop Robert Barron writes that Jesus, the fulfillment of Israel, is the "supreme gatherer" who draws everyone to himself (John 12:32). That's clear in our Gospel reading for today.

In Luke's account, we see that Jesus wants a close friendship with us – to be with us, and dwell with us in all the everyday moments of our lives. Here, Jesus gives us a scenario about the people who never took the time to get to know him. They may have heard good things about him on the streets, but Jesus says, "I do not know where you are from."

In other words, I don't really know what makes you tick, what gives you joy, what challenges and frustrates you. "Where are you coming from?" he seems to say.

As we begin our work again for this new academic year, our prayers turn to those who might be feeling a nudge or hearing a call from our "supreme gatherer." May they respond and take the chance offered by God. "Come from the East and the West and the North and the South." Come and get to know what Jesus has ready for you at his generous table.

### COULD RCIA BE FOR YOU?

Each year, we guide and walk with a group of people who are thinking about becoming Catholic, and those who want to explore the faith. This process is called the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, or RCIA.

This could be helpful if:

- You want to be baptized in the faith
- You want to join us from another faith
- You are Baptized Catholic, but haven't been Confirmed

Sessions for RCIA (the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) will begin on Sept. 11, but inquirers are welcome to come in anytime to talk. We are happy to meet with you personally to discuss what God might be calling you to explore.

# FAMILY FAITH FORMATION (FFF) AND TEEN CONFIRMATION REGISTRATION

**REGISTRATION DEADLINE IS SEPT 1, 2019** for our programs: Pre-K through 7th Grade and Teen Confirmation, which is 8th Grade (High school students are welcome). Parish members whose eldest child will be 3-4 years of age as of Sept. 1, 2019 are eligible for our Pre-K classes.

FAMILY FAITH FORMATION This home-based program requires families to work together at home on lessons. Families meet one Sunday a month at the parish to build community and grow in faith formation and discipleship. We offer three sessions from October thru April: 8AM, 10AM and a Noon Session. In keeping with our SMSP Mission ten hours of volunteer service at SMSP per family is required. Regular Sunday Mass attendance is expected.

1ST RECONCILIATION/1ST COMMUNION This program includes attendance at all FFF Sundays as well as one additional Sunday Parent/Child session per month in preparation for the Sacraments.

TEEN CONFIRMATION Sacramental Preparation sessions will meet twice a month on Sunday afternoons. Attendance at the Fall Retreat and two Service Retreats are required in addition to regular attendance at Sunday Mass. Please register soon as space is limited.

# FAITH FORMATION FOR YOUNG CHILDREN

The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is a Montessori-based approach to the religious formation of children, rooted in Sacred Scripture, Liturgy, and respect for the child's rich relationship with God. Central to CGS is the atrium, a room containing beautiful materials that focus the child's attention on key scripture passages or liturgical moments. After an introduction by the catechist, the children are invited to work with a material on their own to continue their meditation. Because children learn by using their hands, working with materials allows them to enter more deeply into meditation, nurturing their relationship with God.

We invite children ages 3-5 years who are either in preschool or young 5s programs to participate in our Catechesis of the Good Shepherd Atrium at St Mary Student Parish. This faith formation opportunity will be held once a month during the school year (Dates TBA) after the 10:00 AM Mass from 11:15 AM-12:45 PM. It is a drop- off program. Materials cost is \$35 per child for the year and scholarships are available.

# **Diocesan Services Appeal & SMSP Financial Report**





### Thank you for your gifts to the Diocesan Services Appeal!



The St Mary Student Parish Catholic Thinkers Book Club will resume reading, thinking, and discussing on Tuesday September 10, 2019. We will meet in the Loyola Room of the parish office from 7:00 PM until 8:30 PM. We will begin meeting in September and continue meeting each month until April 2020. The books we will be reading and discussing are listed below. The books will be available for purchase from Literati Bookstore. All are welcome and encouraged to participate.

**SEPTEMBER** - *Company of the Poor*. Paul Farmer and Gustavo Gutierrez. This book garnered a number of votes last year but didn't make the top cut, but it's revived this year.

**OCTOBER** - Jesus and the Disinherited. Howard Thurman. Amazon review called this book a "manual of resistance for the poor and disinherited".

**NOVEMBER** - *Here I Stand. A Life of Martin Luther.* Roland Bainton. Bainton was an English theological historian. This book is noted as "the definitive introduction to Martin Luther and is essential reading for anyone seeking to understand this towering historical figure".

**DECEMBER** - *Heretics and Heroes*. Thomas Cahill. This book is Volume VI of a series of histories written by Cahill. It takes a broader view of the times of the reformation and includes the "humanism of the Renaissance and the radical religious altercations of the Reformation".

JANUARY - Trent: What Happened at the Council. John O'Malley. As you might remember O'Malley is the author of Vatican II which we read and enjoyed so this should be good. Also this book is on the heels of our reformation reading and as more knowledgeable folks (Liz) pointed out, Trent addressed the reformation so we will get the church response as well.

**FEBRUARY** - Vatican I: The Council and the Making of the Ultra Montane Church. Also by O'Malley. This completes the council cycle and brings us to the 19th century and what might be considered the (almost) contemporary church.

MARCH AND APRIL - Pope Francis: Untying the Knots. The Struggle for the Soul of Catholicism. Paul Vallely. This book brings us to the 21st Century and the contemporary church. This book comes highly recommended by member Thinkers and as it is two books in one (!) we will read this over a two-month period.
