Pastoral Perspective

FINDING A NEW WAY HOME

Most of my life as a Jesuit has been lived on university campuses, and one of the times in the year that I look forward to the most is when the students return in the Fall. There are few things better than welcoming them back to their spiritual home! But this year is different. As I contemplate the return of students to campus, I feel great unease. I'm scared for the people of our community, and I'm scared for the students. As excited as I am to see them again, I also find myself hoping that the university will tell them to stay home. And I would not be surprised if they do so by the time that this is published. I know that I will greet that news with a mixture of relief and sadness. Such is the nature of this time. Many of us find ourselves having to give up the things—and the people that we hold most dear—out of love and care for them, and each other. There's a tug-of-war underway in our hearts, and it seems the only way to win is by losing.

As I've pondered how campus ministry might serve our students this coming semester, still uncertain about their presence here, and conscious of the ways we will be forced to make them "unwelcome" at our church, I've tried to put myself in their shoes. How can we continue to be their spiritual home when, as far as they are concerned, our physical structure, which so many of them find a home in, is largely closed for business? As blessed as we are to have alternative "virtual" means of connecting with them, it is just not the same as feeling the energy, the closeness and the spirit of dozens of students gathered in the Newman Lounge. Can we invite them to mass, when we know that even if they are vigilantly following safety procedures in their day-to-day lives, so many they encounter probably are not? When we know that through no fault of their own that they may be carrying the virus and not even know it? I've suggested to some of them that this perhaps is not a bad time to reflect and ponder certain questions: Am I willing to give up parties, sporting events, trips with friends in order to be able to go to mass? Is my faith as much of a priority in my life as I think it is? In the absence of my physical "home," how do I make my home with Jesus, and how do I include others in that in ways that may be difficult, or inconvenient? And how do I negotiate my relationship with friends who have different priorities, are making imprudent decisions, and want me to do the same? I, of course, realize as I am thinking of posing these questions to them, that while they might be under greater pressure right now, these are questions that we all find ourselves asking. What were once hypothetical questions have now become real

life choices. This moment is requiring of us great moral and spiritual courage as we try to take care of each other, and mourn the loss of the familiar comforts of the "homes" we now realize that we took for granted.

As I write these words, the analogy of being a refugee comes to mind. We are experiencing what it means to be unrooted and alienated from places we know as home. It is a reminder that before there was the global Covid crisis, there was the global refugee crisis, which is ongoing. So, even as we feel like refugees ourselves, let us not forget the tens of millions of people around the world driven from their homes, and searching for a new one. When we have rediscovered our homes both physical and spiritual, hopefully our hearts will be all the more moved to help them to do the same. Our Lady of the Way, pray for us.

BAPTISM CLASS—ENGLISH

A baptism preparation class will be held once or twice a month. Classes are limited to 4 families, masks and proper social distancing is required. If you are able, we ask that you pick up a baptism preparation packet from the Parish Office at least one week prior to the class. The packet contains articles and discussion questions for parents and godparents. During the class there is an opportunity to ask questions and schedule the baptism date. The class is required to be taken only once. It does not need to be repeated for additional children.

Those wishing to have their children baptized at St. Mary Student Parish should be registered members here for at least three months and active, contributing members of the parish. To arrange a baptism and to begin the preparation, please contact the parish office.

The 2020 U.S. Census timeline has been shifted in order to better protect the health and safety of the general public and the U.S. Census Bureau employees during the COVID-19 pandemic. **Michiganders now have until October 31, 2020 to respond.** The Catholic Church in Michigan has promoted full participation in the count <http://www.micatholic.org/advocacy/2020-census/> because of the ramifications it has for individuals and local communities:

- The count influences legislative representation at all levels of government, where decisions about the common good and the most vulnerable are often made.
- The Catholic Church relies on an accurate census to more effectively serve those in need.
- Under-counting households leads to under-funding critical programs and services.

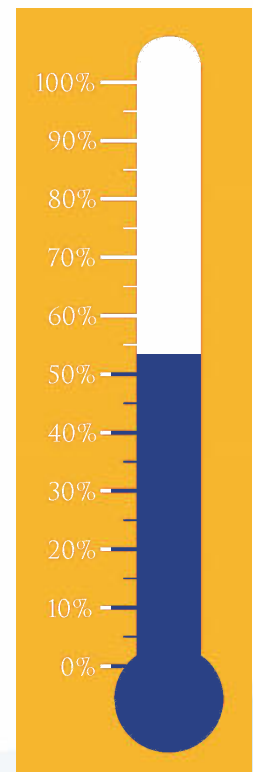
