



LIVE-STREAMED MASS & COMMUNION DISTRIBUTION

You can watch our live-streamed masses on Sundays at 9:00 AM in English and 10:10 AM in Spanish. Recordings of the live-streamed masses are available anytime following the conclusion of the mass, so you can gather your housemates and all watch together at 9:00 PM if that works better for you!

We also distribute communion at the parish on Sundays from 11:30 AM-12:00 PM. You can come anytime in that window.

MASS RESERVATIONS

Students can make a reservation to attend our 5 PM Mass on Sundays or weekday masses. *Attendance is limited to 50 people and you must have a reservation.* Daily mass is currently scheduled for Tuesdays and Thursdays at 5:10 pm but may change over the next few weeks as we try our best to find a new normal. CAMPUS MINISTRY

With the help of your input, we will be offering "Newman Lounge 2.0," an opportunity to gather a couple of times a week in the arboretum. We will also be exploring ways of making the courtyard at the church available for use by small groups of students. We hope to begin these gatherings the week of September 7.

Campus Ministry will be organized this year with smaller group activities in mind. We will soon be inviting you to join small faith communities of 10 students each, which will be led by our student interns. These communities will serve as the foundation of many things we do this year.

IG.NITE

Ig.nite will continue on Thursday nights, with mass at 5:10 PM followed by the featured speaker or program beginning live online at 6:30 PM. We have invested in a new online platform which should make this a smoother experience than a Zoom call. Our first Ig.nite will be Thursday, September 10. RETREATS AND OUTREACH

Our Fall Retreat is unlikely to happen as originally planned. We will be working on creating alternative retreat opportunities outdoors or online. We also encourage you to participate in the Retreat in Daily Life, which will begin sooner than usual this year, and extend through to Thanksgiving. Retreat in Daily Life registration will take place soon. Keep an eye out for more information.

BAPTISM CLASS—ENGLISH

EXAMEN FOR LIFE DURING COVID-19

from the Ignatian Solidarity Network

The Examen is a traditional method of prayerful awareness that is a bedrock in Ignatian spirituality and Jesuit education. It's a short, easy way to reflect on your day and become more mindful about where you are experiencing grace or goodness and where there is room in your actions and life for growth. Especially in times of uncertainty and rapid change, taking time to reflect becomes essential.

What people don't often realize is that the Examen is exceptionally flexible and adaptive. It can be used to review your day or it can be adapted to hone in on a specific issue or focus. So in light of the new set of circumstances many of us find ourselves in with COVID-19, it is helpful to adapt the Examen to this unique situation.

2020 CENSUS

The 2020 U.S. Census timeline has been shifted in order to better protect the health and safety of the general public and the U.S. Census Bureau employees during the COVID-19 pandemic. Michiganders now have until October 31, 2020 to respond. The Catholic Church in Michigan has promoted full participation in the count http://www.micatholic.org/advocacy/2020-census/ because of the ramifications it has for individuals and local communities:

- The count influences legislative representation at all levels of government, where decisions about the common good and the most vulnerable are often made.
- The Catholic Church relies on an accurate census to more effectively serve those in need.
- Under-counting households leads to under-funding critical programs and services.

Visit https://my2020census.gov/ now to fill out the 2020 Census, which will take approximately ten minutes to complete. The process is safe, secure, and confidential, and your response will help direct how billions of federal funds for local communities are distributed over the next decade.

RACIAL JUSTICE RESOURCES

This new column will feature resources in support of our mission to live a faith that does justice.

KNOW JUSTICE, KNOW PEACE: A JESUIT ANTIRACISM RETREAT

"But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all-surpassing power is from God and not from us." 2 Corinthians 4:7

"Know Justice, Know Peace" is a four-week retreat hosted by The Jesuit Post during the month of August that seeks to assist Christians in their growth as antiracist followers of Jesus. It will consist of twelve short talks published in the form of videos and podcasts on TJP's media platforms.

As a Jesuit retreat, it follows the basic structure of the Spiritual Exercises of Saint Ignatius of Loyola, and provides varied tools to the participant along the way from the Jesuit Spiritual Tradition.

- Week One (beginning Aug 3) focuses on Sin and its consequences, in this case the sin we are examining is racism and the consequences is the oppression of Black Indigenous and People of Color (BIPOC for short).
- Week 2 (beginning Aug 10) focuses on what it means to be a follower of Jesus and how antiracism is a necessary component of such discipleship.
- Week 3 (beginning Aug 17) contemplated the passion and death of Jesus and how we can see this in the unnecessary suffering and violence towards BIPOC. Finally,
- Week 4 (beginning Aug 24) focuses on the Resurrection of Jesus and thus examines where we can find hope in the struggle towards becoming an anti-racist society.

Visit https://thejesuitpost.org/category/know-justice-know-peace/ to participate in this virtual retreat. Since all retreat materials (videos, written reflection, or podcast) are posted to this website, you can participate in the retreat at any time and go at your own pace. New videos and reflections were posted each Monday, Wednesday, and Friday so there are three unique topics and presenters contributing each week.


HOW ARE DSA CONTRIBUTIONS USED?
