Pastoral Perspective

REMEMBERING STEVE

In a few weeks, it will be seven years since my friend Steve died. Anyone who knew him knew at least two things about him: he was extraordinarily generous and kind, and he loved good food and fine wines. I'm thinking of him today because he chose today's

first reading from Isaiah for his funeral mass. Isaiah assures us that "the Lord of hosts will provide for all peoples a feast of rich food and choice wines." Steve asked me to preside at his funeral, and when I saw the reading he chose, I laughed out loud. Of course! How appropriate, Steve.

In a few more weeks, we will be approaching the fall and winter holidays, celebrations on which we are so accustomed to rich foods and (perhaps) fine wines in the presence of family and friends (and, if we're blessed, maybe even some strangers). But I'm guessing that many of us are looking at these holidays differently this year. In many cases we can't celebrate them as we usually would. Apart from the cautions surrounding the pandemic, we're living at a time of a good deal of anxiety for all that's going on in our country and in our world. If the pandemic isn't keeping families apart, I hear more and more that political differences are. It's a strange contrast to hear Isaiah's message of God's great banquet celebration at a time when such celebrations are so much more difficult for us.

But, of course, these celebrations that we might be missing are not the Great Banquet that Isaiah foretold. God's banquet is different. Rich food and choice wines are not the only nourishment we need, and in fact, they are not necessarily even the nourishment we need. I hear the voice of St. Paul in the middle of today's readings saying, "In every circumstance and in all things I have learned the secret of being well fed and of going hungry, of living in abundance and of being in need." The nourishment Paul finds in Jesus has nothing to do with his immediate circumstances; it comes rather from his ability to see about him and within him the grace of God at work even when he was imprisoned and his life seemed near its end. He found the grace of God at work through the support of the Philippian community, in their love and care for him, even when they could not be together. He insisted that somehow, he could see God's banquet spread out before him, even in his lonely prison cell. It comes, I think, from his commitment to believing that God's love and the way Jesus calls us to live that love are constant, unchanging, despite any and all change in the world around us. Are we committed to the same belief?

We buried Steve on my birthday that year. (I'll never forgive him for that.) Isaiah's reading always takes me back to Steve's funeral, a gathering with Maria, his wife, and his family, and with friends who traveled across the country to be present. We all shared a common experience of our memories of food and wine with Steve, and the extraordinarily gentle yet faith-filled-ly determined soul that he was. But as we chuckled about his choice of the first reading, and as we remembered all those meals and toasts we shared over the years, we all agreed on one thing: our time with Steve was never really about the rich food and fine wine. It was about the love. It was always about the love.

106TH WORLD DAY OF MIGRANTS AND REFUGEES

September 27th was the 106th World Day of Migrants and Refugees. Pope Francis's theme this year was: *Like Jesus Christ, forced to flee.* So often we look at migrants, refugees and displaced persons as statistics, but they are real people! Once we get to know them and hear their stories, we are able to understand their precariousness that we have come to experience ourselves as a result of this current pandemic. This is a constant in the lives of displaced people.

The United States has a long history of welcoming and resettling refugees from around the world. Each year, the president is required by law to consult with Congress to determine the number of refugees allowed to be admitted to the U.S., a process known as the "Presidential Determination" (PD). This year, the Administration has only sent recommendations to Congress for a PD of 15,000. They must still consult with Congress about the recommendation and set the final number.

If the PD for FY2021 is finalized at 15,000 refugees, it will be the fourth consecutive year that our country will have the lowest refugee admissions goal in the program's history. Meanwhile, there are over 26 million refugees worldwide with over 1.44 million in need of resettlement. These decreases have already meant lost protection for religious minorities; for example, in 2016, 1,524 Iraqi Christians received refuge in the United States compared with only 86 in 2019- a 94% decrease.

As Catholics, we affirm the inherent dignity of every person and the ability of refugees to seek security and safety for themselves and family members. Further reducing refugee resettlement numbers mean that refugees fleeing persecution are left in harm's way, that refugee families are left separated across the continents and that the U.S. retreats in its global leadership position.

The guide does not include lists of political positions to take as a Catholic, but it suggests opportunities for personal engagement through reflection questions, prayer prompts and anecdotes.

Contributor Father Penton explains that "faithful Catholics support different candidates and policies. To us, that's not a reason to not engage in politics. That's a reason to be more reflective, to be more prayerful, to enter into dialogue about how our faith informs our politics. It is not a reason to retreat from politics."
