FOCUSING ON OUR IGNATIAN PRINCIPLES

"God is like the sun and his gifts are like sunshine. God is generous beyond all imagining."

gratitude

One of the best ways to grow deeper in love with God is to live in a spirit of gratitude.

That's a main element of Ignatian thought, says author Jim Manney in his book, *Ignatian Spirituality, A-Z*, (Loyola Press).

Note: Jim Manney is also a parishioner here at St. Mary's. Here are some thoughts on gratitude adapted from the book:

"In the Ignatian view, our relationship with God is founded on gratitude. God is the infinitely generous giver of gifts and blessings; we respond with gratitude and profuse thanks.

'We will much sooner tire of receiving his gifts than he of giving them,' Ignatius wrote to a friend. The first step of the Examen is to 'give thanks to God our Lord for the favors received.' This is the deepest truth about our spiritual condition – that we are in a relationship with a loving God who generous beyond our wildest dreams.

Gratitude was so important to Ignatius that he believed ingratitude was the deadliest of sins. Out of all evils, he wrote, 'ingratitude is one of the things most worthy of detestation.' So much so, he continued, that ingratitude is 'the cause, beginning, and origin of all evils and sins.' It's often said that pride is the deadliest of the seven deadly sins. But where does pride come from? Ignatius suggests that it's rooted in that sense that we are entitled to the good things we have, or that we've somehow acquired them through our own efforts. In other words, pride stems from ingratitude."

Toward the end of the Spiritual Exercises, Ignatius urges us to pray for gratitude: "To ask for an intimate knowledge of the many blessings received, that filled with gratitude for all, I may I all things love and serve the Divine Majesty."

Prayer:

Good and gracious God, we praise you and thank you for the gift of your Son who brings your message to each of us. Open our hearts to hear the words that you speak to us and give us the courage to respond with the same generosity, in faith and love. Amen.

RETHINKING THANKSGIVING: THE NATIVE AMERICAN PERSPECTIVE

This year marks the 400th anniversary of the gathering of European settlers and possibly members of the Wampanoag tribe for three days of feasting near present-day Plymouth, MA. It was a day of "thanksgiving," a practice that both Native American and European cultures understood. Just over half of the Plymouth Colony settlers who disembarked from the Mayflower had survived the bitter winter of 1620-21 and the remaining members would have perished from starvation had a treaty of peace and cooperation not been signed between the Wampanoag and the colonists. Hunting skills and agricultural tools, supplies, and knowledge provided by the Wampanoag People yielded the bountiful harvest and reason for this thanksgiving feast.

Wampanoag Confederation had entered into this treaty knowing well the duplicity of these foreign visitors. The Confederation had occupied this land for nearly 12,000 years and at their peak numbered over 40,000 men, women and children. Summers were spent along the Atlantic coast, engaging in agriculture and fishing; winters were spent inland where game was plentiful. The arrival of the Europeans brought diseases and the Wampanoag had just suffered such a massive epidemic within the 4 years prior to the Mayflower's arrival with entire villages being wiped out. In addition, European explorers and fur traders had killed or captured young Native Americans and sold them into slavery or exhibited them as "curiosities" in Europe. Finally, Wampanoag People were being threatened by neighboring tribes who were trying to dominate them. Massasoit, the head sachem (chief), viewed this treaty as a necessary and mutually beneficial document. It remained intact and mostly honored by both groups for over fifty years and stands as the only such treaty that outlasted all the original signatories.

As colonists continued claiming increasing land, violence escalated into wars that resulted in most of the Wampanoag being killed, captured or sold into slavery in the Caribbean. Today, New England remains home to nearly 5,000 Wampanoag living in 6 tribal communities and engaging in hunting and fishing. They are preserving their culture, language and oral tradition so that their identity and dignity survive for future generations. "We are still here" is the phrase adopted by the Wampanoag in 2020 not only to declare their existence but to affirm their right to dignity and recognition!

This Thanksgiving holiday is a great opportunity to acknowledge the gifts of the Wampanoag and other Native Americans! Some suggestions are adding a traditional Native American dish to your dinner table, becoming familiar with Native American culture and traditions, or reading about current issues plaguing Native Americans.

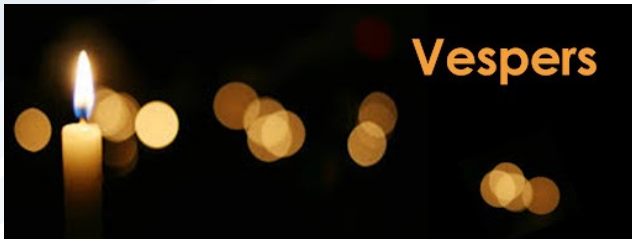

ONLINE GIVING NEWS

In April 2020, we added a new online giving platform – “Parishsoft Online Giving”. We have received positive feedback on how user friendly it is. We would like to move all online giving over to this platform and discontinue using the legacy system by December 31, 2021. This will reduce the cost of maintaining two systems.

Parishsoft is offering a Donor Match Program for all givers who add new recurring donations from Nov 1 thru-Dec 31. For every new recurring donation that is added in that time period, Parishsoft will match the donation, up to \$50, with a maximum match of \$1,000 per organization. Below are the simple steps to transition to this exciting new way to give!

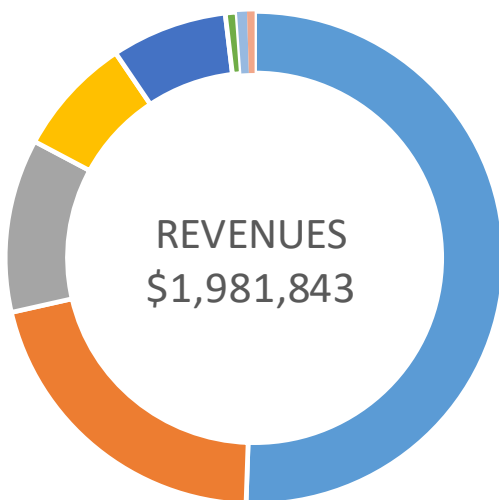

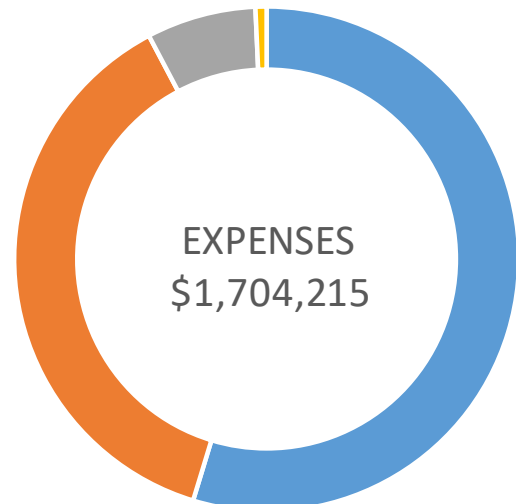
2020-2021 Summary for Annual Report

St. Mary operates on fiscal year of July 1 through June 30. We ended the 2020-2021 fiscal year with net income of \$277,628, however \$148,966 of that was from the PPP loan forgiveness. Revenue (not including the loan forgiveness) was \$18,623 higher than budget and our overall expenses were \$110,699 less than budget. Donations to Sunday offering and the annual fund were higher than budgeted while other sources of revenue were lower than budgeted. While the majority of savings in expenses can be attributed to lower staff costs, we also experienced savings in programming costs as we were not fully open for a good portion of the year due to COVID-19. We did spend some of these savings on three building repair and maintenance type projects; re-caulking the terra cotta bricks outside on both the church and the Newman Center, elevator repairs and replacing the microphones in the church.

So, the net income in 2020-2021 was very different than the \$22,720 net loss experienced in the prior fiscal year. Two fiscal years affected by COVID with very different results. We are humbled by the fact that donations to Sunday offering and the annual fund are remaining strong (i.e. in total about the same level as pre-COVID). Looking forward to the 2021-2022 fiscal year, hoping a year less affected by COVID, we are looking forward to incurring more expenses as that would be an indication that we can offer more programming.
