INTENTIONAL LENTEN DECISIONS

Lent begins this Wednesday. Every year, Ash Wednesday and the Lenten season appear to catch me off guard. I walked into Meijer one day last week to find the bakery overflowing with paczki of every kind! Lent is here, whether I am ready or not.

Usually, I am not ready. Lent always seems to fall at a time when I am in a lull. The bitter grey

and cold of winter have yet to give way to the warm, sunny days of spring. Changing the clocks somewhere in there disrupts my sense of time. By late February and early March, my semester consumes all my intellectual energy, leaving little space to think about what I am going to do for Lent. Will I give something up? Will I do something extra? I feel pulled in both directions because there is virtue in both. I think depriving myself of something (meat, coffee, TikTok, etc.) opens and allows me to experience the simple Christ. Doing something extra means I may spend more time with God during my day, which is also meaningful. These two options turn my Lenten "activity" into a stressor more than an opportunity to grow in faith, and thus I typically make some sort of nonspecific commitment to "pray more," which never seems to play out as I like.

Last year, though, I found myself in a bit of a professional rut and under more stress than normal. When Ash Wednesday approached, I felt God calling me to be more intentional about my spirituality for the upcoming Lenten season. On the last day of registration, I signed up for the Busy Person's Retreat and told myself I was going to do an abridged version of Ignatius' Spiritual Exercises. I discovered so much about who I am, how God sees me, and how I see God. I came to know Jesus and felt peace in knowing that Jesus experienced many of the same feelings I felt at the time. I saw the same God that Joel did, one who is slow to anger, overflowing with kindness and compassion, one that wanted only the best for me and for me life. That brought a sense of peace I had not felt in months. I remember thanking myself at Easter for making an intentional decision on what to do for Lent.

Some people can grow closer to God by giving something up. Others by making extra time for God in their already busy days. For me, it usually changes year to year. I think what matters most to God is our willingness to try to get to know him and his son more during these forty days. As we approach the new liturgical season, may God inspire us with new ways to deepen our spirituality.

Into the Light is a fellowship group that has been meeting on Saturday mornings during Advent and Lent since the 1970's. Using Sunday's prayers and readings, we will have a breakfast with a potluck, and round-the-table we each share brief reflections of what stood out in the readings. 

It's been a week since my surgery, and in many ways it feels like it was weeks ago. I am feeling good and stronger each day, and find this time not only one of physical recuperation, but also spiritual renewal.



I was telling a good friend recently

that moving toward prostate surgery has me thinking I am entering into a new chapter of life that I would entitle, "You're Not Invincible." After some days here and lots of prayer, I think a more apropos title would be Jesus Draws Near. This has been an opportunity to turn again toward Jesus and allow Jesus to come near, to come hold me, form me, and heal me. Lent offers us a time of metanoia, a time to turn toward Jesus and allow Jesus to enter our hearts and change us.

These days have also been a time of tender emotions. As you know, I am a sentimental person. I have been crying a lot this past week. Ignatius talks about the gift of tears in the Spiritual Exercises, a gift that especially happens in prayer, not tears of sadness, rather tears that flow from being touched by something profound. I have been so aware of God's unconditional love showering down upon me. I am soaked! As I find myself in the hands of God, I am blown away by God's love shown clearly to me in my life's story, family, friends, and all of you.

My desire is to make a return, to respond in love, a love that never seems to measure up to the non-stop unconditional love of God I continually receive. Nonetheless, I still want to lead with Jesus' love and mercy. In a world on the verge of another armed conflict, in a country that continues to grapple with the reality and sin of racism and our complicit involvement, in a world where millions simply long for a safe home, I want to say again, and again, yes, send me.

I am excited about Lent. I long to be back with all of you. I am praying for our students who are off to Alternative Spring Break sites. I am humbled by your generosity that will allow us to sponsor a refugee family and give them and their children a home. I am praying for all the Small Church Communities that are launching their prayer and reflection this week. I am looking forward to coming back and praying with you, celebrating the sacrament of confirmation, first communion, and many weddings and baptisms. I look forward to leaving here and spending some time with my 92-year-old dad and family this week as I continue to recover and get ready to come home to St. Mary Student Parish.

In response to God's tremendous love, I pray often St. Ignatius' *Suscipe*. I offer daily all that God has given – my life, my memory, my health, my will, everything bestowed upon me. Lord, I return all. Take my life, my hands, my mind, and my heart. All I have ever wanted was your love and your companionship. I have been given that. Thank you, send me, send all of us.



Ignatian Spirituality & Yoga Retreat

IGNATIAN SPIRITUALITY & YOGA RETREAT REFLECTION

Hello all,

Our names are Claire Kausch and Joey Imperial and we had the blessing of attending an Ignatian Spirituality and Yoga retreat with Fr. Bobby Karle the weekend of Feb. 4-6. As part of our retreat, we were asked to provide our perspective on the Jesuit Universal Apostolic Preference of "Journeying with the Youth." After receiving other retreatants' positive reaction to our talk, Fr. Bobby invited us to share this reflection with you all in this week's bulletin.

Our first yoga and Ignatian spirituality session Friday night was the foundation for our retreat as we learned what yoga actually means, mainly that "yoga" is derived from the Sanskrit word "Yuj" meaning "to join", "to yoke", or "to unite". In the lens of Christianity, this practice is a means to a union between the Holy Trinity and our souls. Obstacles to this union can come in many forms. In the Yogic tradition, these separations of union are called "kleshas" and include ignorance, ego, attachment, aversion, and fear of death, while in Christian tradition we know these separations as sin that can also take a multitude of forms. The youth today, as we've experienced, are subject to wide scale separation from union, most especially through prevalent dependency on technology.

Growing up in the "technological age" has proved to be an incredible challenge to finding union with our own identities, with others, and with God. Even as early as elementary school, we have always felt the pressure to be active users of social media in order to be a part of the "in crowd". As we've spent more and more time absorbed by social media, however, we've come to realize that being in the "in crowd" often means hiding the imperfect, real, messy parts of ourselves and subsequently believing that our worth only lies in how perfect our life appears. There is significant research evidence that the structure of the most popular social media sites exploits our brain's dopamine "reward center" to keep us addicted to scrolling, retweeting, etc. in manners scarily comparable to that of drug addiction. This addicted investment in a digital realm has manifested itself in our real worlds through neglect of relationships, avoiding the slightest discomfort of social interaction by avoiding or ignoring others, and missing out on civil, meaningful conversations that could practically never occur digitally given the ideological volatility of online platforms. Our technology has pulled us further away from the beautiful

vision of how we are seen in God's eyes and belong as precious members of His body. Instead, our social media has taught us to believe that the only way to receive love is to earn it, that our flaws should be hated and hidden, and that the way to "belong" online is by being as unique and individual, and ultimately alone, as we can be.

We have found that one of the most fruitful ways to draw youth from those harmful environments is to encourage inperson engagement with each other, between youth, parishioner, and all those in between, to develop a physical, tangible community. We saw this very engagement occur at voga retreat as people, many of whom we had never met before, approached us, wanting to learn from us about the youth experience and how to connect with the youth in their lives. In these conversations, we spoke freely, with no fear of judgment, as we were met with only open hearts and gratitude for our presence. These were clear affirmations to us that our burdens are not a result of an inherent generational flaw, but are byproducts of our digital environments, and that our stories are truly valuable. They listened to us, encouraged us, learned from us, and we learned from them more than they could ever know. We were in communion with them, and in those moments we saw clearly how each of our individual relationships with God ties us together into a beautiful fabric of thought, emotion, prayer, and physical community. We hope to continue practicing this union with God and others every day, and we challenge everyone reading this to engage a physical community in a special way these next few weeks, whether with your friends, family, or strangers.

IN THE SPIRIT OF IGNATIUS

Focus on the gifts we'll receive during Lent, not on Lent as an ordeal

As we move toward Ash Wednesday this coming week, we can be inspired by some thoughts from Jesuit author Andy Alexander, S.J, and Maureen McCann Waldron:

Just imagine that this Lent is going to be different from every other Lent we've experienced. Imagine that there will be many graces offered us this year. Let's even imagine that God is going to help transform our lives, with greater freedom, greater joy, and deeper desires for love and service.

Preparing our hearts is a process of preparing our desires. This means practicing our sense of anticipation. If we imagine Lent as an "ordeal" or a time to dread in some way, then we've already pre-disposed ourselves to not get very much out of it. These days before Lent are a time to start anticipating something wonderful that is about to happen.

Our sense of excitement and anticipation will grow more easily if we begin to imagine what God wants to give us. There is something coming that we can truly look forward to. If we get too focused on ourselves and what we are going to do or not do, we could risk missing the gift God wants to give us. We have to keep aware of the fact that grace comes from God. This is about God's great desire to bless us. With this mindset, it is easier for us to imagine that what we really want to do is place ourselves in a space to receive what God wants to give us.

We receive God's gifts as body-persons. We experience things with our senses, relish them with our imaginations, and share in God's own creative and loving activity when our hearts and hands work together for and with others.
