

FATHER'S DAY REFLECTION BY CAROL KONCZAL, RECEPTIONIST

Of all the 10 commandments, I find the 5th one to "Honor Your Father and Your Mother" especially challenging as of late, which is why I volunteered to write my first, and possibly only, pastoral perspective for our bulletin. I love my father dearly but at 90+ years it's been increasingly more difficult to honor him. He has few filters and I'm seeing my dad as I've never seen him before. It's hard to adjust to my "new dad" because he's so different physically than when I was growing up. My once vibrant, active father whom I played tennis and pickleball with, can no longer walk and needs care 24/7. But, by far, the hardest thing to witness is how unhappy he is. He finds no joy in his surroundings and this breaks my heart.

My folks were married nearly 68 years when my mom passed 2+ years ago from Alzheimer's related issues. He was devastated. I was at peace with her being out of pain and in heaven. I was sad, but as my good friend said about her mom when she died from Alzheimer's, she lost her mom several years before her physical death. So did I. She was either my mom if she remembered me or a sweet old lady happy to see me if she didn't. She called me Claudia once so I played the part and it was fun!

My dad lost his best friend, soul mate and rock. He also lost the ability to drive and live independently. He feels his purpose in life is gone because "everything" has been taken away from him.

I can't even come close to knowing what that feels like. I can only try to empathize and show him that there may be something good about life and to remember all the good he's done for his family.

After 2 years of listening to how miserable he is, it's taking its toll on me.

I try to visit my dad every Thursday after work and I always wrestle with these thoughts of how to "put my Jesus hat on" when I do so. On the hour+ drive, I pray for a conversion of his heart and that God take care of him and grant him peace—whatever that looks like to him/ Him. I also pray for an open mind and a conversion of my unsympathetic heart.

Another good friend of mine once told me to "love people where they're at" and that's what I try to do now. It worked for my mom. Plus, it's a way of honoring her because I know she'd want me to love him where he's at today.

My dad still worries about me driving home after I visit because it's dark out. He's still concerned how my kids are, how my job's going, how my marriage is and how my pickleball game is. It's sweet when he asks because that's the dad I grew up with. If I just show up with an open mind and heart, I see glimpses of my father as I once knew him.

I can't fix my dad, but I can rest assured that he is taken care of at the assisted living home with the basics of food, water and a safe place to live where people are there 24/7 to help him when we can't. My siblings all have different gifts to offer. My sister Barb is his primary caregiver (and saint). She goes up there every day and even spends the night if she feels he needs it. My brother Jack is his POA and handles his financial and medical affairs including taking him to the VA or other dr. appointments. My other sibs and I either work full time or live out of state and pitch in when we can with phone calls, visits or prayers.

I feel that honoring him also honors God because it's what He commands of us. I am fortunate enough to have a loving father who showed me God's love in everything he did for all 8 of us. I only wish he could feel God's love for him again. I thank God for the wonderful father I have and for all the great many lessons I've learned from him on what to do and what not to do. He's been my rock for so many years and I pray for the patience and love to honor him in his 9th inning. I will probably let him read this on Father's Day knowing he'll cry but hopefully it'll be tears of joy and sorrow kind of indicative of life.

ST. LUKE N.E.W. LIFE CENTER

Sunday, July 9th

On Sunday, July 9th at all of the Masses, Sr. Carol Weber, OP and Sr. Judy Blake, SSJ, founders of St. Luke, will visit St. Mary and bring with them graduates of their programs and employees from their social enterprises to speak to our community.

St. Luke N.E.W. (North End Women's) Life Center is a faith-based environment providing life skills, education and workplace training, empowering women and men to become self-sufficient.

Programs

They offer a variety of programs including literacy, computer training, work development and life skills development. A new nutrition program was added to address needs from the water crisis.

Community

They provide services to the local community including a food pantry, hot meal program, Christmas giveaway, water distribution site and a donation center for clothing and household items.

Social Enterprise

They operate several businesses that employ program graduates and give them the opportunity to become self-sufficient. They are job creators, and the types of jobs they create save and change lives.

St. Mary has a long standing relationship with St. Luke N.E.W. Life Center. Our Alternative Spring Break students and Flint Family Service Trip participants have worked at the Center for several years. We have also supported them through our Advent Giving Tree program. This Appeal offers us a chance to make a difference in the lives of the people of the north end of Flint – providing hope and healing to the structurally unemployed.



CENTERING PRAYER

Mondays | 6:30 PM

Centering Prayer is a silent practice of prayer that rests on the faith that Christ is present within by his Holy Spirit. It is an excellent preparation for contemplative prayer, which is a grace or gift bestowed by God. Centering Prayer is an intentional openness to, or practice of "waiting" on God, encouraging the building of a more intimate relationship with Jesus and the movement of the Holy Spirit. It is rooted in centuries-old monastic prayer.

The book <u>Open Heart, Open Mind</u> by Fr. Thomas Keating, OCSO is a good introduction. The first Monday of each month we listen to an introduction to centering prayer and then pray for 20 minutes. Otherwise, we typically sit and pray for two 20-minute sessions with a short meditative walk in between. All are welcome.

BAPTISM CLASS


6/26, 7/31, 8/21 -attend one class only

On the last Monday of every month (occasionally, the date is changed due to holidays, etc.), St. Mary Student Parish holds a baptism class for new parents at 7:00 pm. Parents who are preparing to have their child baptized in the Catholic faith should pick up materials for the discussion from the Parish Office at least one week prior to the meeting they plan to attend. The baptism preparation packet contains articles and discussion questions for parents and godparents. It also contains a Baptism Registration form which must be filled out prior to class. At the discussion, parents (and godparents, if possible) will have an opportunity to ask questions about Catholic Baptism and schedule their baptism in the Church. If you've attended a baptism class before, we don't require you to attend another.

In order to have a baptism here you either need to be registered here OR get permission from the church where you are registered. We do Sunday baptisms during the mass and are celebrated by the priest. Only one child may be baptized per mass on Sundays. Spanish Baptisms are usually scheduled every other Sunday after the 2pm Spanish mass at 3:15. Three children can be baptized after the Spanish Mass.

We grateful for the opportunity to celebrate the miracle of new life and welcome new members into our parish family through the Sacrament of Baptism.

To Strengthen Our Parish and Our Diocese

Let Joe Do it

An old adage we know too well. Imagine what our world would be like if Jesus had said those very words to the Father! In life, there are times when we are presented with the opportunity to make a difference in our lives and the lives of others, yet, sometimes we hesitate to meet the challenge and hope someone else will. The Witness to Hope campaign is one of these moments where we can change lives. The truth is that like Jesus to change lives it means it will take some sacrifice on our part.

Each of us in this parish community can not only enhance our own faith life, but also the faith life of our parishioners and fellow Catholics throughout our Diocese. Our parish is using its share of the funds raised for many important projects that already have been outlined. Meeting these needs will allow our community to be able to better serve all of us, and bring us all through ministry closer to Christ. To achieve all this, we need your support to make it happen. Your personal participation is the key! Your support is needed and is important to the success of this endeavor. So far, the average parish conducting *Witness to Hope* has had 30% of its people participate. It is our hope that our parish will surpass that level, as we are truly not an average parish!

In the coming weeks, we will hold several campaign gatherings and we hope that you will accept the invitation to attend. It is the sincere hope of our campaign leadership that each of you will prayerfully discern your level of support and make your best sacrifice to our campaign, which is all we ask — your best sacrifice, based on your other obligations. Reaching, even exceeding our goal, will make it possible for us to enhance our facilities, support our community and energize the Body of Christ throughout our Diocese.

"Charity Begins At Home"

Here's another old adage to think about ... Charity does begin at home, which for us Catholics is not just at our parish. Our Catholic home is in every parish in our Diocese and every place where two or more are gathered in His name. Our Catholic home is in every town in our 10 counties, in the inner city, in our Catholic schools, in the seminaries, in the homes of retired clergy, and in every location throughout our community where Christ's love is present.

The Witness to Hope campaign presents a unique opportunity not only to impact our lives but also

the lives and faith journey of other Michiganders throughout our Diocese. This impact will be felt in future generations, profoundly and deeply. Let's show that we are committed to our faith and not wait for Joe to do it; let's work together to share Christ's love.

Why is the Diocese conducting this campaign?

The Catholic Diocese of Lansing is moving forward on a historic journey to raise \$65 million in its first-ever comprehensive diocesan campaign called *Witness to Hope*. Based on the vision of Bishop Boyea's pastoral letter *Go and Announce the Gospel of the Lord*, this campaign will advance the ability of parishes to meet critical needs, and for the Diocese to fulfill the shared mission given to us by Jesus for years to come.

How were parish goals determined?

Each parish goal is based on the amount equal to total offertory for that parish in 2015. Parishes with exceptional local needs were able to set goals higher based on need and the results of a successful feasibility study.

What happens if we don't reach our goal?

If the parish does not reach its goal, there will be NO assessment to make up the difference. The parish is simply required to make a "good faith" effort.

How will I be asked to participate?

Every household in the parish will be invited to attend a gathering or meeting in home; or at the Church during the education period. You will receive a personal packet of information to allow you to continue to consider your gift and then act following a meeting.

Is my gift confidential?

Yes, the gift packet you received will be personal to you and your family, and will not be shared with any other members of the parish community.

How much should I give?

Each household will be asked for a gift range, not a specific amount. You will be asked to give this your prayerful consideration and make a Decision of Faith based on the spiritual principles that we should give out of gratitude for the gifts God has given us — out of Joy rather than obligation — and finally — out of Love as Christ showed His selfless love for all of us.

How will I be reminded about my payments?

The Diocese of Lansing is handling all the pledge redemption efforts at no cost to the parish and will send out regular reminders based on the frequency you request (monthly, quarterly or annually).

How will the parish receive its share?

Based on the actual funds collected during each quarter, beginning with the first dollar raised, the Diocese will send the parish a quarterly share check for its portion of the funds during the full redemption period.

Will we be conducting the Diocesan Service Appeal as well as Witness to Hope?

The DSA appeal will be suspended for 2017.

How long is the pledge period, and when will I receive my first pledge reminder?

Pledges can be made over a 5-year period, and parishioners may choose the beginning month and select whether to receive monthly, quarterly, or annual reminders.
