UNDERSTANDING IMPLICIT BIAS

--- SMSP Anti-racism Working Group

A young African-American professor enters a crowded and lively afternoon tea in his department, the colleagues talking freely, socially or professionally. Yet nobody looks at him. Why is that, and what are we as Catholics to make of this?

How normal the situation must seem to the colleagues looking the other way. The young professor points out that it has been so his entire time at the university and has made him feel very excluded. Since none of his colleagues would likely admit to explicitly choosing not to look, we should examine whether this isn't a form of implicit bias, a bias that people may not even be aware of, though the impact of such actions may at times be much more powerful on others than our intent.

It is natural that one has a sense of "one's own", but in the end, too strong a sense of this identity is contrary to the Christian vocation of love for our neighbor, and paradoxically maintains, for example, the sense of isolation and "otherness" which people of color feel every day. We may not be aware of biased treatment against others like what the young professor experienced, but he certainly feels this every day. This is a very small example of the harm which implicit bias can do to our neighbors, but that's the point it's so small yet so personally experienced, so constantly reinforced, down to the smallest detail. One keeps the other at such a distance that we cannot spare a look in his direction? Or the young man in Silent Beats (linked below): what assumptions about crime are being made there? Implicit bias is a fertile soil for the poisonous weeds of explicit bias, as witnessed by the current resurgence of openly racist remarks in America.

Implicit bias is well-hidden within us, but with God's help we may open our hearts to a way out of its spiritual confines. As Catholics we are used to examining our consciences. As we reflect on our own actions, let us pray for greater awareness and understanding. With His help we can see past the curtain hiding implicit bias from ourselves, making our world a place more full of love and joy.

Prayer: Lord God, free us from the bonds of bias, and lead us to a love of all persons, all of us created in your likeness. As the pope has reminded us, "We cannot tolerate or turn a blind eye to racism and exclusion in any form and yet claim to defend the sacredness of every human life." May this be our motto. Amen.

Note: This is part of a monthly series to help parishioners to learn more about racism, to reflect on our conscious and unconscious attitudes, and to pray that we all work to fully accept, honor, and support all people as children of God.


