



Pope Francis has called us this year to celebrate a holy year of mercy where we can profoundly witness to the Church's mission to be a harbor of healing and transforming love. Moved with compassion, we will touch the face of mercy and encounter Christ active in our world.

In response to Pope Francis' call, St. Mary Student Parish will focus each month on two of the traditional *works of mercy*. Our focus the month of January will be: **shelter those without homes and console the despairing.** Social Justice Ministry will provide resources and concrete ways we can celebrate this Jubilee Year:

- **Prayer**-ideas for individual and communal prayer; lives of the saints and holy witnesses to be our companions for the journey.
- **Education and Encounter**-information and analysis about the root causes of poverty and injustice; stories of people living in poverty and injustice and opportunities for encounter.
- Action and Advocacy-ways to put your faith into action by meeting the immediate needs of others through service and raising our voices through advocacy.
- **Reflection**-questions and resources for discernment and understanding.

These resources will be available on our website, in the bulletin, and on permanent display in the atrium.

Be Merciful Like the Father

The warmth and joys of Christmas linger in our minds, and the start of a new year renews a spirit within us that says: this will be the year I get organized. Or, this will be the year I lose that extra weight, get involved in my community, [insert your goals and aspirations here].



But for many in our community the new year raises questions, instead of aspirations, and renews fears. Among them, how will I keep

warm in the bitterly cold January temperatures? For these members of our community, there were no new boots and scarves wrapped under the tree, topped with a sparkling bow and opened with eyes of surprise and glee.

As the temperatures drop, life-threatening risks rise for the homeless. Among the more serious risks is hypothermia, when the body's temperature dips below 95 degrees. Warning signs for hypothermia include uncontrollable shivering, memory loss, disorientation, incoherence, slurred speech, drowsiness, and obvious exhaustion. At 91 degrees, you can experience amnesia. At 82 degrees, you can lose consciousness. Below 70 degrees, death can occur.

Here at St. Mary, we participate in the **JANUARY DAYTIME WARMING CENTER** each year. For the month of January, we are hosting those in need of emergency shelter during the day in Newman Hall. We are unique in that we have smaller rooms available for rest, as well as a common area for food, games, and conversation.

This community needs conversation and support as much as it needs a warm space. Help us welcome the homeless by stopping



by the shelter (no sign-up required) Monday through Friday from 8 AM to 4 PM. Share a smile, play a game, and listen to their stories. We still need a few volunteers to sign up for the official time slots and donate food -



Liturgy 101

St. Mary Student Parish is taking a deeper look at the way we celebrate the Mass. Each week in the bulletin (and at stmarystudentparish.org) we will explore the meaning and origins of the Sacrament that is central to who we are as Catholics.

Liturgy of the Eucharist

After presenting our prayers of intercession to God, we move into the second part of the Mass, the Liturgy of the Eucharist. This central part of the Mass follows another Jewish tradition, the Passover Meal. In the Passover Meal, prayers are said to remind the people of God's love and mercy, and food is blessed and shared.

In the early Church, the Eucharist was celebrated in the context of a meal, similar to the way Jesus himself initiated it during the Last Supper. ("While they were eating, Jesus took bread, said the blessing, broke it and giving it to his disciples said, 'take and eat, this is my body." – Matthew 26: 26-27)

However, the early Christians soon separated the Eucharistic celebration from an actual meal in order to prevent confusion between this and pagan ritual meals. The celebration, however, continued to be based on the actions of Christ at the Last Supper. Over time, these actions became the core of a more elaborate set of rites, and the Liturgy of the Eucharist as we know it took shape.

"We certainly do believe that, in our rituals, Christ's paschal mystery is made present here and now. But it is mystery – not history – that we celebrate in the Mass. ... In Liturgy, we do not look [for a detailed experience of what it was like back then]. Instead, we look to experience God in our world today: to bring him to glory in our own day and age, and to have our modern lives made holy by his timeless grace."




