

Third Sunday of Lent

Lenten Reflection

By A Female Parishioner

What's your math placement?" "I placed out of the language requirement; did you?" I wince as I hear conversations like this outside of my office door when entering first year students come to register for fall classes. It seems to be human nature to compare ourselves to others in order, at best, to recognize our gifts and our weaknesses, and at worst, to feel better about ourselves in the face of others' failings. The second reading for this third Sunday of Lent uses comparison as a prod to true humility.

In our second reading today, Paul exhorts the Corinthians to avoid the "grumbling" of the Israelites wandering in the desert with Moses. He points to these Israelites as examples of how not to behave: show ingratitude, ignore the commandments, believe you know better than God. The passage implies that they were mistakenly self-assured, as it closes with the warning, "Whoever thinks he is standing secure should take care not to fall;" i.e., if you compare to those Israelites in complacency, then get ready to fail.

It's easy for me to be complacent during Lent. I do so many of the right things--attend the Ash Wednesday service, faithfully participate at mass, keep the required fasts, donate during special Lenten collections, et al.--in order to assure myself that I'm doing all that God wants of me. Or is that all? It's easy just to go through the motions in these Lenten practices. However, Jesus reminds us in today's Gospel that God most desires repentance, a change of heart, lives given over to God's mercy. This mid-Lent, let us allow Jesus to nourish us as we mindfully move through these practices and in the times of quiet prayer where we attend to His call.

Question for Reflection:

 Where are you complacent in your relationship with Jesus?

This Lent you have been cast into the story. The roles will not always be easy; you may find yourself tempted by the devil, as Jesus was for 40 days in the wilderness. Or you may find you've turned away from Jesus, as Peter did on the eve of the crucifixion.

We are all cast into different roles, at different times, but during these times we must remember we are all one cast: the children of God. Open your heart this Lent and let the drama prepare you for the risen Lord.

The following themes will guide us on our journey:

- Ash Wednesday: We are cast as a common humanity.
- First Sunday of Lent: We are cast as children of God.
- Second Sunday of Lent: We are cast as a blessing to others.
- Third Sunday of Lent: We are cast to a universal need for grace.
- Fourth Sunday of Lent: We are cast to return home.
- Fifth Sunday of Lent: We are cast to be merciful.
- ◆ Palm Sunday: Casting Call!

Each week, we're passing out a small card as you exit the church to help guide your reflection. We invite you to keep this card in your pocket, on your dashboard, or even on your fridge - place it where you'll have a moment to reflect on how you're cast into the story.

This meditation question:





Dear Parishioners,

We are continuing our intensive work on setting in place the foundational infrastructure that will allow our liturgies to flow smoothly. With this infrastructure in place I hope you will be able to experience these liturgies more deeply. We also believe that this work will allow us to attract an excellent candidate as the new Directs of Music and Worship. The following points will give you a sense of our work to date.

God's Peace

Mass Coordination

- New missalettes with music and Sunday readings along with the new additional of the Gather hymnal allow us to participate more fully and sing some contemporary Catholic music.
- We continue to recruit liturgical ministers, particularly ushers, from your midst and train them to assist us all in our worship.
- We have prepared detailed scripts for all special masses, notably Palm Sunday and services of the Easter Triduum. These
 scripts, combined with additional rehearsals for presiders, ministers and other key participants will allow all participating to de
 so in a more relaxed and meaningful way.
- The preparing of instructions for all masses standardize ministers' work across all masses, allowing more parishioners to
 participate and to do so at different masses on a Sunday. Similar guides will be completed for special masses, including
 weddings and funerals.
- A new system for setup and cleanup for all masses plus a newly standardized pattern for the distribution of Communion to
 those present allow more parishioners to participate, help ministers understand their roles more clearly and help those
 present to receive Communion in a more fluid manner that allows more prayerful movement around the church.

Musicians & Music Ministry

- Choir directors and pianists meet regularly Fr Ben and Fr John to discuss appropriate musical selection during Ordinary time
 (January) and the Lent and Easter seasons. Music sung at masses should support and expand the readings of the day and
 themes of the liturgical season, making the experience of those attending mass richer and more meaningful.
- We continue to develop a real sense of team work among all musicians and to begin the process of recruiting new musicians
 for this year and next year. We have also established a goal to use music as a worship in which all participate and avoid a sens
 of music as performance.

Average Attendance Comparison (see chart below)

- This year's attendance is slightly higher than last year's and noticeably higher than 2012.
- The data suggest that at least some of those who used to attend the 10:10am and 7:00pm masses continue to worship at St. Mary but at a different mass time, often 8:30am and 5pm.
- Attendance at the 9pm mass is overwhelmingly made up of undergraduates.
- Lower attendance at 2:00 is likely due to a Spanish language mass offered at St. John the Baptist in Ypsilanti (new as of 2013).

Liturgy 101

St. Mary Student Parish is taking a deeper look at the way we celebrate the Mass. Each week in the bulletin (and at stmarystudentparish.org) we will explore the meaning and origins of the Sacrament that is central to who we are as Catholics.

Liturgy of the Eucharist

(Breaking of the Bread)

After *the Sign of Peace*, the breaking of the bread is next: yet another symbol of the unity of those gathered in Christ. In this ritual, the presider takes a small piece of the consecrated bread and adds it to the precious blood. This early medieval rite, called the commingling, is a symbolic reuniting of Body and Blood to symbolize the resurrection of Christ.

The presider says an accompanying prayer asking for the ultimate fruit of the meal: eternal life. "May this mingling of the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ bring eternal life to us who receive it."

So the bread, though broken, is one loaf; so we who will share in this meal become "one body, one Spirit in Christ. As St. Paul says to the Corinthians, "because the loaf of bread is one, we, though many, are one body, for we all partake in the one loaf." (1 Corinthians 10:16)




