

REFLECTING ON THE READINGS REHDINGS

In my second year of graduate school, I was invited to help with the Easter Mass in a correctional institute. The Mass was celebrated by the archbishop in the prison chapel and was both simple and profound. I was moved by the humility and courage of the eight incarcerated men who entered into the waters of baptism, allowing the light of Christ to shine through what was surely a dark place in all of their lives. But what struck me most was the offering. As the gifts were being prepared, a collection basket was passed through the congregation, just as it is passed here at St. Mary's. The difference was what the basket contained: a bar of soap, a pen, a cigarette. These men didn't have money, yet they were giving all that they had to give.

The widows in both the first reading and the Gospel do something that I am usually too stingy or too afraid to do: they give their whole livelihood. It's easy for me to be generous when I'm giving away my excess. I donate clothes I no longer wear to Salvation Army or give a little of my extra cash to someone on the street asking for money. But I can't imagine giving away all the food in my fridge and all the money I would use to buy more groceries. Yet this is the lesson that Jesus is teaching us when he points us to the widows and when he pointed me to the men in prison. Give everything. Give until it hurts. Give, because all that you have is a gift from God and it never really belonged to you in the first place.

"Do not be afraid," says the prophet Elijah. Words that Jesus repeats to us time and again in the Gospels. I'll be the first to admit that this message contradicts everything that most of us have learned about good financial planning. We've been taught to save and to leave ourselves wiggle room and to be afraid of running out. But Jesus envisions a world in which everyone has enough of everything and no one has anything to fear. We may never fully see that world in our lifetime, but maybe we can do a little something to help make it more of a reality here on earth.

Campbell is a religious leader, attorney and poet with extensive experience in public policy and advocacy for the poor. Astronomy, God, and the Search for Elegance

Sunday, November 22, at 2:30 pm St. Francis of Assisi Parish

You're invited to attend the presentation on **Astronomy, God, and the Search for Elegance** by Brother Guy Consolmagno, Director of the Vatican Observatory

A lot of people might be surprised to hear that the Vatican has its own observatory. That's one of the reasons we have it: to surprise people. With the observatory, we remind people that the Church supports and embraces science. We are not afraid of the truth; we actively seek it. St. Paul reminds us that God reveals himself in the things He has created. The Vatican Observatory was first founded by Pope Leo XIII in 1891.

Scientific theories must do more than merely satisfy the data; they must do so in a way that is (to use a term much favored by mathematicians) "elegant." By looking closely at a handful of astronomical images, we'll explore the way that one proceeds from an emotional appreciation of the beauty of the stars and planets, to a deeper understanding that satisfies both reason and emotion. Ultimately, this link between "elegance" and rational truth has profound theological implications.







Dear St. Mary's Family,

I know there has been some confusion among you since we announced last spring that we would be seeking a full-time Music and Liturgy Director for St. Mary's so I wanted to provide some clarity from my perspective. I have been blessed to provide leadership to our music ministry for 20 years and have enjoyed every second . . . especially the ridiculously talented students that I have been so fortunate to work with throughout the years. I do, however, also have a full-time job at the University that I absolutely love! After 20 years of two jobs, I am ready to settle into the "only one full-time very demanding job" way of life! Simultaneously, we are ready at St. Mary's for someone who can dedicate themselves full time to shepherding our liturgies and the students and volunteers who make them so special. When I talked to Father Ben about my desire to move away from having major responsibility for the entire music ministry, we decided to move forward with the seeking a fulltime director.

Since we have not yet found the right candidate for that role, I've agreed to stay on in a limited role this year and will continue to work with the student leaders of our music ministry to make sure all of our liturgies are covered and to give guidance on music selection. Fr. John Ferone, SJ, who is new to the parish, will also work with our music ministers and will provide guidance, formation, and community building for them. I am very excited for his role in this work!

I will continue to sing and play the piano at the 5pm mass, right where I've been since 1986! Leading the small group at 5 has been my role since long before my Music Director position started and I hope it will continue long after it ends. There is a special kind of joy that comes with making music with that group of people!

I am grateful beyond words for the ongoing support of the parish, for the students who have come and gone and enriched us forever, and for the blessing of serving this parish!

Dear Friends,

As you will probably remember, in May we mounted a search for a Director of Worship and Liturgy. We did so as part of working toward a larger goal of revitalizing our liturgical life overall so that the parish could be yet more a beacon to those now not attending mass; our masses could be what attract and retain a larger group, especially young people and especially students.

That search brought us three very good candidates - all of whom turned us down. Their stated reasons were that they were all organists and/or choir directors and wanted to continue playing and directing. What was unspoken, but clear, was that they did not want to give up performing to do what we really needed, namely, to be a mentor, guide and coordinator for our student musicians, to unify our masses thematically within a single Sunday and throughout a liturgical season, and to oversee the logistical work necessary to optimize student/resident participation in the liturgies at a high standard.

In light of this turn of events, the campus ministry staff and I have taken on the responsibilities for all aspects of our liturgical lives, beginning with the Sunday masses. By January, 2016 I expect that we will know with greater clarity what kind of person or people we need to take on the responsibility for these masses.

We have divided up our work as follows:

- Fr. Eric, Kelly Dunlop, Bill Alt, and Abby Braun are recruiting, training and forming liturgical ministers.
- Matt Rejniak, Campus Ministry Associate, is taking responsibility of updating our manuals that list the responsibilities of liturgical ministers.
- Anita Bohn will continue to assist as Music Coordinator for the student pianists and choir directors, hiring musicians and guiding the selection of music, as she has in the past. She will also continue as pianist and principal cantor for the 5pm Sunday
- Fr. John Ferone, SJ, and I are working with the student musicians as a group to provide them training and spiritual formation for the preparation of music for all Sunday masses. Fr. John will also help them to discover music from the Catholic tradition and other traditions beyond that which we have sung in the past.
- Emily Gibbons, Campus Ministry Associate, will be the day-to-day contact and support for these student musicians and will assist in recruiting additional students to roles in the music ministry. She will also act as liaison between the Jesuit presiders and the student musicians in terms of themes on which presiders want to preach each Sunday.

As trained musician with experience in music ministry, I will work with the above people and our students to ensure good coordination among all.

If you have any questions about any of these matters, please do not hesitate to ask me.

Liturgy 101

St. Mary Student Parish is taking a deeper look at the way we celebrate the Mass. Each week in the bulletin (and at stmarystudentparish.org) we will explore the meaning and origins of the Sacrament that is central to who we are as Catholics.

Liturgy of the Word (Second Reading)

After the Psalm, the lector proclaims the second reading. This reading comes from the New Testament, most often from one of the epistles (the majority of these are from the writings of St. Paul, which provide both blessing and challenge).

The epistles are instructional letters by the Apostles to the earliest Christian communities, offering spiritual advice on how to live as a disciple of Christ. The advice and counsel offered to these earliest Christians is there to help all of us, as we too, strive to live out our faith.

Unlike the Gospels, these writings are not stories. Sometimes these letters explain some facet of theology surrounding the person of person of Jesus or his paschal mystery.




