Graduate reflection

In mid-February, I committed to a year of service after graduation at a women's shelter in Boston through the Jesuit Volunteer Corps. The day after accepting the offer, I remember staring at the packing list of items I was allowed to bring with me for the year: a week's worth of clothes, some toiletries, bedding, and bath towels. One of JVC's core values (and one of the things that attracted me to it in the first place) involves living in simplicity so as to better live in solidarity with the people that you are serving. But that day in February, I remember thinking there was no way that I could do that. What about my favorite books? Am I allowed to bring my guitar? Exactly how many pairs of shoes are included in a week's worth of clothes? I realized - slightly terrified - just how little I actually needed, but how much I was deeply attached to. Despite my affection for these things, I started trying to accept that I wouldn't be able to take them all with me.

With graduation on the horizon, I have been forced to ask myself these same questions about my time here at U of M. What will I leave behind? Most importantly, what from my four years in Ann Arbor do I want to bring with me? It didn't take too much reflection for me to realize that one of the hardest things for me to have to leave behind will be this community here at St. Mary. However, I have realized that while I can't take much of the physical aspects of St. Mary with me, that doesn't mean that I have to leave it all behind. Sure, I'll be separated from some dear friends, but I will take with me crucial skills on how to have healthy, meaningful, Christ-centered relationships. I won't be able to take my favorite chair in the Newman lounge where I've spent countless hours studying, but I will be taking with me the importance of cultivating welcoming spaces within the communities I am a part of. My favorite spot to pray (up by the tabernacle in the church) will not be transplanted to Boston with me, but my relationship with God that was formed there will definitely be coming with me.

I've come to realize that as I move to a new city and on to a new chapter of life, I will not be heading to Boston emptyhanded. My hands might only be carrying a single suitcase, but my heart will be overflowing with all the love, support, faith, and friendship that the students and parishioners in this community have gifted me with during my time here. God has allowed me to receive so many graces and joys from such a generous community. My hope is that this year with JVC provides me with the time and space to give back in the same manner that I have so generously been given to.

Whether or not you are also facing a big life transition, I encourage you to take some time to reflect this Easter season on what God is prompting you to let go of in your life. I'm learning that we often have to be intentional in making sure that our hands and our hearts are free enough to receive the gifts and graces God so lovingly wants to give us.

Thinking of becoming Catholic? We'd love to talk



This is the time of year when many people are making decisions about various paths in life, and often, they contact us about exploring the Catholic faith.

We welcome seekers and inquirers at any stage, and are happy to talk with you about the OCIA journey. OCIA (formerly known as RCIA), stands for the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults. It's the process the Church has created to help new members join the Catholic faith.

Here at St. Mary, our OCIA sessions help people who may be think-

ing about becoming Catholic, as well as adult Catholics who have never completed Confirmation. Formal sessions begin in September, but it's a good time to discuss your journey as a faith seeker and see if we can help you discern where God might be leading you.

Since we're a student parish, we have many students and young adults who prepare throughout the year. Our sessions are from 7 to 9 p.m. on Wednesdays (following the U-M and holiday schedule). Inquirers will be initiated into the faith at Easter, if they feel ready.

Wondering about the name change?

Most people are familiar with the program's former name, RCIA. After the Vatican II sessions in the late 1960s, the Catholic Church restored the ancient catechumenate form of education for new members. The process was outlined in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults.

The RCIA book is now being re-translated from the original Latin. This is part of an effort started by Pope John Paul II in 2001 and continued by Pope Francis in 2017. Going over each of the books for the Church's various rites, the Bishops' Conferences around the world (including the U.S. Bishops) have been updating their translations.

The RCIA book is one of the last to be updated, but the U.S. bishops decided in 2021 that the word "order" is more appropriate in the name, in part because the Latin name was *Ordo Initiationis Christianae Adultorum*. In the new translation, the word ordo became order.

The new word is also more comprehensive, emphasizing a continuous process of spiritual formation for those who want to join the Church. The individual rites are still in place, but the name conveys that the preparation process is a journey toward discipleship with Christ, not just a series of checkpoints to complete.

Despite the new name, our parish remains committed to providing a welcoming, prayerful space for learning and growing in the faith. For more information, visit our website and click on the registration form. <u>michigancatholics.org/to-become-catholic/</u>
